PROPERS FOR THE LITURGY OF ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM

Tropar of the Resurrection, Tone 8: You descended from on High, Merciful One. You accepted the three-day burial to free us from our passions. Lord, our Life and Resurrection, Glory to You.

Tropar of Theophany, Tone 1: When You, Lord, were baptized in the Jordan, the worship of the Trinity was made manifest. For the voice of the Father bore witness to You and called You His Beloved Son. The Spirit in the form of a dove, confirmed the truth of His Word. Christ our God, Who has revealed Yourself and has enlightened the world, glory to You.

Tropar of the Dormition, Tone 1: In giving birth, you preserved your virginity. In falling asleep you did not forsake the world, Birth-Giver of God. You were translated to Life, Mother of Life and through your prayers you deliver our souls from death.

Kondak of the Resurrection, Tone 8: By rising from the tomb, You raised up the dead. Adam is risen and Eve exults in Your Resurrection. The entire world celebrates Your rising from the dead, Greatly Merciful One.

Glory... Kondak of Theophany, Tone 4: Today, Lord, You have appeared to the universe and Your Light has shone on us who with understanding praise You; Unapproachable Light, You have come and revealed Yourself.

Now and ever... Kondak of the Dormition, Tone 2: Neither the tomb nor death had power over the Birth-Giver of God, she is ever watchful in her prayers, and in her intercession lies unfailing

hope, for as the Mother of Life, she has been translated to Life, by the One Who dwelt within her ever virginal womb.

Prokimen of the Sunday after Theophany, Tone 1: Let Your mercy, Lord, be upon us as we have put our hope in You.

Verse: Rejoice in the Lord, you Righteous. Praise befits the upright.

2nd Prokimen of Theophany, Tone 4: Blessed is He Who comes in the Name of the Lord. God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us.

Reading: Ephesians 4:7-13

Alleluia Verses, Tone 5. Light dawns for the righteous and joy for the upright of heart.

Be glad in the Lord, you Righteous and give thanks for the memory of His Holiness.

Bring to the Lord, children of God. Bring to the Lord glory and honor.

Gospel: Matthew 4:12-17

In Place of "It is right in Truth,". Magnify my soul, the Most Pure Virgin Birth-Giver of God who is greater in honor than the Hosts on High. Irmos, Tone 2: No tongue is capable of praising you worthily. The angelic mind is overawed in exalting you, Birth-Giver of God. But accept our faith since you are good and know our divinely inspired love. You are the Protectress of Christians and we magnify you.

Communion Hymn: Praise the Lord from the heavens. Praise Him in the Highest. The grace of God that brings salvation to all has appeared. Alleluia (3X)

BLESSING OF HOMES

The act of blessing homes of Orthodox Christians is done each year on or after the feast of Theophany. This act is the central sign of God's sanctification of all things through Christ's baptism in the river Jordan and his epiphany to the world. The family is considered, by the Orthodox faith, to be a small church. The sanctification of the home takes place with prayer and the sprinkling of holy water. The priest, at this annual visit, asks God to have mercy on the house, to rid it of every evil and to fill if with every blessing. Everyone of the house, prays together for the living and the dead of the family, and all who live and have lived in the house. They all sing the hymn of salvation and process from room to room while the priest blesses the house. These general guidelines are observed: A candle with an icon and some holy water should be placed in a suitable place, such as kitchen or dining room table, or a home altar. Also, a list of first names for whom prayers are to be offered, including members of the family and all those living in the house. The list should have a clear distinction between the living and the dead.

Reasons for Jesus submitting to Baptism:

- 1. To fulfill all Righteousness: To be consecrated to God and approved by God.
- 2. The public announcement of the arrival of the Messiah and the inception of His ministry.
- 3. Identification with human sin and identification of himself with the peoples' movement toward God.
- 4. To be an example to his followers.

By Metropolitan Anthony of Sourozh. When a human enters into the world, he enters from nowhere, from total, radical absence enters through the gates of time in order to grow into eternity. He enters an ephemeral world in order to become citizen of God's Kingdom. When Christ was born, the Eternal entered into the narrow limits of time; He Who was immensity itself was limited by space and became a man in the flesh although the fullness of the Godhead abided, dwelt in this human frame. He entered into a world of sin in order to overcome sin, and in a world of suffering to endure it all together with us.

But on the day of His Incarnation God delivered unto us in the frailty of the child of Bethlehem the fullness of His love, and love is always defenseless and frail, abandoned and surrendered. It was an act of God by which He gave Himself to us and in which the humanity of the Incarnate Son of God was helplessly delivered into the history of mankind.

When we are baptized, we are plugged into waters that cleanse us from sin. When Christ came unto Jordan, He came sinless, but this time in the maturity of manhood, at a point at which His human will, identified with the will of God, made Him a self-offering; He brought Himself there to begin, to start the way to the Cross. Thousands were baptized in the Jordan, and each of them proclaimed his sins, and these waters of Jordan were heavy with the murderous sins of men. Christ had no sin to proclaim and to confess, and when He entered into these waters of Jordan, He entered, to use an image of a contemporary divine, as one plunges, walks into a dye — He was dyed with the darkness of our sins. He came out of it carrying all the sins of the world. He came out of the waters of Jordan loaded with the condemnations that lay upon the world. And there is the time when He begins His ascent to the Cross.

We are now keeping the feast of the Baptism of Christ, a dread event, an event that should keep us spellbound, in awe: Him Who is pure shares the impurity of sin universal so that He may save us. We will bless the waters, the natural waters that surround us and pray the Lord to send upon these waters grace and blessing for them to become pure and holy, endowed with the power to cleanse and to renew, to make us and all the objects and all the places where they will be sprinkled, partakers of this purity of the waters of Jordan who had touched the holy body of the Incarnation, which had taken upon Himself all the evil of world. So let us pray that the grace of the Spirit of God may come upon these waters and that they may be truly blessing and salvation by the power of Christ, by the power and dwelling of the Holy Spirit. Amen.
