

We use **candles** in our prayers as a deeply symbolic practice that reflects our faith and devotion. Candles are often lit both for the living and the departed, signifying different spiritual intentions. Lighting a candle represents Jesus Christ, who is described in the Bible as the "light of the world" (John 8:12). The candle reminds believers of His presence and guidance in their lives.

When a candle is lit for the living, it is an act of intercession. The person lighting the candle prays for God's protection, blessings, and guidance upon those individuals.

It also reflects unity within the Church, symbolizing the collective prayers of the faithful.

For the departed, candles signify a prayer for their souls, asking God to grant them rest and peace in His eternal presence.

Orthodox Christians believe in the communion of saints, meaning the living and departed are spiritually connected. Lighting a candle for the dead is an expression of love, remembrance, and hope for their salvation.

The act of lighting a candle is a small offering to God, symbolizing selflessness and devotion. The melting wax represents the believer's prayer and sacrifice being offered to God.

The steady flame of a candle also represents eternal life and the soul's journey toward God.

Lighting a candle is an act of personal devotion and a symbolic offering to God. The candle represents the person's prayer, faith, and sacrifice, and the donation reflects their willingness to contribute to the Church as an act of love and gratitude.

By lighting a candle, individuals engage actively in worship and connect their personal intentions whether for the living, the departed, or their own spiritual growth—with the communal life of the Church. In Orthodox Christianity, giving to the Church is seen as a way of expressing gratitude to God and contributing to the life of the Church community. Lighting a candle with a donation aligns with this principle, as it integrates prayer with material support for the faith.

In summary, lighting a candle in an Orthodox Church is both a spiritual practice and an opportunity to support the Church materially. It embodies the faithful's prayerful intentions while helping sustain the sacred space where the community gathers to worship God.

Reflection on the Gospel. The story is told that one day a beggar by the roadside asked for alms from Alexander the Great as he passed by. The man was poor and wretched and had no claim upon the ruler, no right even to lift a solicitous hand. Yet the emperor threw him several gold coins. A courtier was astonished at his generosity and commented, "Sir, copper coins would adequately meet a beggar's need. Why give him gold?" Alexander responded in royal fashion, "Copper coins would suit the beggar's need, but gold coins suit Alexander's giving:"

Let it not be said that Alexander's generosity exceeded that of our generous God. This week's readings make the point that God reads and responds generously to what is in a person's heart - regardless of where that person comes from.

Jesus is hanging out in Gentile territory when he encounters the Canaanite woman. She is doubly disqualified from asking Jesus for help, as she is an unclean Gentile and is an unaccompanied woman. Yet she clearly hopes Jesus can and will do something for her daughter who is tormented by a demon, so she dares to approach him with her request.

Initially, Jesus remains silent in the face of her question, but when his disciples urge him to get rid of the woman, Jesus says, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel" (Mt 15:24). But perhaps even Jesus was impressed by the tenacity of this mother. She charges ahead, saying, "Lord, help me:" Jesus makes his refusal more pointed: "It is not right to take the food of the children and throw it to the dogs" (Mt 15:26). But the quick-witted woman doesn't miss a beat.

"Please, Lord, even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters" (Mt 15:27). Because of her faith, he heals her daughter.

This is the kind of largesse which "suits" God's giving. But can we muster faith like that of the Canaanite woman? Christian journalist Philip Yancey writes: "Unlike the Canaanite woman, I am easily discouraged by the silence of God. When my prayers are not soon answered, I am tempted to give up and not ask

again. ... All too often I find myself ... dangling somewhere between belief and unbelief, wondering how much I miss out on by my lack of faith:'

QUESTIONS TO PONDER:

- Are you persistent in prayer, even in the face of God's (apparent) silence?
- Do you believe that God reads and responds to what is in a person's heart, regardless of race, creed, gender, age, status and so on?
- Have you experienced the kind of generosity that "suits God's giving"? Do you try to extend that same kind of generosity to others?
